## **Issues of Loss**

• Farmers' distress as NCPB rejects maize

Persisten rain in the North Rift region of Kenya has hampered the intake of maize by the National Cereals and Produce Board that requires that maize have low moisture content. Lack of enough drying facilities and minimum sunlight has forced NCPB to reject maize with high moisture content, likely to lead to the development of aflatoxin.

<u>Mill breakdown</u>

About 400 rice farmers in the Fiji province of Macuata have been affected by the breakdown of the Rewa Rice mill. Rice farmers say about 100 tonnes of paddy have been piling on their farms for the past month and they don't know who to turn to for help.

No quality check on paddy

The Koraput district rice millers' association in India has alleged that it is being forced by officials to lift paddy under custom milling without quality analysis at procurement centers in the ongoing kharif marketing season. Some senior officials admit quality checks are not being made due to lack of infrastructure.

• Jalalabad mill fails to deliver rice to FCI despite two extensions

Mill owners in Jalalabad, India, have allegedly embezzled paddy belonging to the government. The millers have neither deposited rice milled from the paddy worth Rs 6.76 crore nor have they contacted FCI regarding any actions to recover the material.

• Slow paddy procurement leads to distress sale

Delay in lifting of paddy from procurement centers in Odisha, India, by state procurement agencies has led to a distress sale benefiting rice millers and private traders.

<u>Food corruption: grainy details emerge as officials unpack dust from wheat bags</u>

It came as a shock to FCI officials when they found husk, dust, and farm waste packed in gunny bags of wheat meant to be distributed to various

areas of Karachi, India, for the production of flour.

In response to the Food Security Bill aimed at feeding millions, Chairman of India's Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices, Ashok Gulati, says that the "economic inefficiencies and the losses incurred [in the system] will outweigh welfare gains you are trying to achieve".

The grain – mainly sorghum and maize – is stocked in large granaries, collectively constructed and aptly named 'cereal banks', in the middle of the manyattas, or homesteads.
